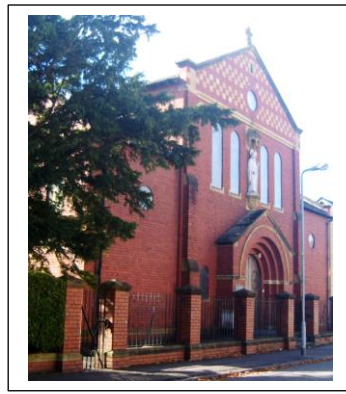

MESSAGE FROM CANON MIKE

This weekend we have 'Mothering Sunday', a time when we think of our Mothers, those living and those who have died. This is a time when we can say 'Thank You' for what they have done for us. Also this coming week, we celebrate the Feast of St Patrick, the Patron of our Parish. There is a common theme which I hope to explain in these few words.

'Mothering Sunday' is about one's "Mother Church" and ours is St Patrick's in Grangetown. During Medieval times when all these islands were Catholic, you were expected to travel back to your Mother Church, the place of your Baptism to confess your sins in preparation for the Feast of Easter. Sadly the Religious significance has been lost. Now it is all about flowers, chocolates and cards.

Many of you wish to return to your Mother Church to meet as a family, the Family of God under the protection of St Patrick. Sadly we've not met for a number of months and that yearning to congregate is deep within our hearts. Most of us have shed tears, as we miss our families, friends and relations. Soon we will meet and the tears of sorrow will become tears of joy. It has been a time of exile, a journey into the wilderness, a journey towards the Promised Land.

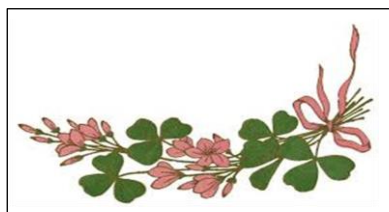
Patrick was an exile, taken from his family and friends by Irish Pirates. He too suffered the loss of his community, a community of Believers in the Gospel of Jesus Christ, the Good News. He lived an austere and harsh life away from his 'Mother Church'. He knows what each of us is yearning for because he experienced it. He is close to each of us, he is our brother in Faith.

As I celebrate Mass this Sunday on the 4th Sunday of Lent "Laetare Sunday" and the Feast of St Patrick, I'll remember all women, especially those going through some difficult times, mothers alive and those who have died. These I will bring to Mary Our Mother and St Patrick.

I'm unable to travel to the place of my Baptism, St Joseph's, Neath but St Patrick's has become my home. I miss Neath, I miss my Mother and I miss you, my 'Grangetown Family'. So wherever you are, may St Patrick Bless, Protect and encourage us all during this difficult period.

RE-OPENING OF THE CHURCH

Our intention is to open up for public Mass, next Saturday (6.30pm) and Sunday (10.00am) (20th and 21st March)
Please remember that during these Masses ALL restrictions will still apply.
This being the case we will also resume our weekly Masses of Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday 10.00am.

Palm Sunday (27th 28th March): We intend to have the weekend Masses again with restrictions and there will be changes to the Liturgy.

Mass of the Last Supper, Maundy Thursday: This will be celebrated, but unlike other years the Blessed Sacrament will not be taken to the Altar of Repose and there will be no Service of Watching.

Good Friday: This Service will start as usual at 3.00pm, however, we are limited in what we can do so there will be a shortened form of the Liturgy.

Easter Vigil and Easter Sunday: Again, the Liturgy for both of these services will be shortened.

The Bishops of England and Wales have issued guidance which has been sent to all Parishes and we are obliged to follow their directions along with the rulings from Welsh Assembly Government.

It was easy to close the Churches during these past few months but remember it was for your safety that I closed St Patricks. The dilemma has been in the re-opening: should I? If so, when? We must take into consideration the health and safety of you and the stewards and cleaners who are at each service. So in anticipation I thank you for your co-operation and the stewards who are willing to assist at these services.

Finally, I hope next week to explain to you, via the newsletter and during Mass, more details of what will take place during the Holy Week Services.

Booking a place: If you intend to be present at any of the services of Holy Week, a booking system similar to what we had at Christmas will be in place. There will be no tickets as such, but because of number restrictions you will need to book a place. Please give your name to Chris at the back of the Church.

One year On : Remembering Our Loved Ones

On 23rd March 2021 we will reach a significant milestone in the country's fight against Coronavirus: for it was on this day that we entered the first of the lockdowns. With these words of the Prime Minister, our lives radically changed, and the era of a 'new normal' was ushered in:

"From this evening I must give the British people a very simple instruction - you just stay home".

Since then, we as a nation have lost over 121,000 lives, with the total here in Wales exceeding 5,000. These are no mere statistics: each number is a life, each life is a memory, each life is a family trying to grieve in such exceptional circumstances.

On Monday, 23rd March, I will celebrate a Solemn Requiem Mass at St. David's Cathedral for all the faithful departed who have died as a consequence of the pandemic.

I have opened a Book of Remembrance at the Cathedral, and I invite you to send in the names of your loved-ones who have died over the last year as a result of the pandemic.

The Book of Remembrance will be given place of honour at the Requiem Mass before the Pascal Candle at the Requiem Mass. If you would like the name of your loved one included in the Book of Remembrance, please email Fr. Daniel at cathedral@rcadc.org

The Solemn Requiem Mass will be celebrated at the Cathedral 12:45pm on Monday, 23rd March. Due to limited numbers able to be safely present at the Cathedral, those who may wish to attend will need to reserve a seat by telephoning Fr. Daniel Stanton at Clergy House on 029 20 23 14 07. There are thirty-four spaces available in the Cathedral for yourself or your bubble. These seats will be reserved on a 'first-come-first-served' basis. The Requiem Mass will also be live-streamed through the Cathedral website.

love.

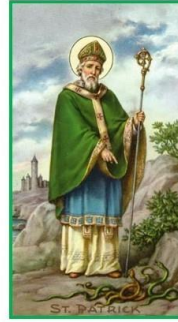
Let your love be present in every home,
