I was told during the week of a family in France who read our Newsletter, who remember travelling on my Father's bus in Neath. I talked last week of the bus coming for each of us, taking us home to 'Our Father's House' to participate in the 'Great Banquet of Heaven'. I use that image but none of us know when the bus will arrive.

This theme is carried on by Jesus in this week's Gospel, not a bus story, but a story of a Wedding Feast... Bridesmaids waiting for the arrival of the Bridegroom. There are times when I stand on Corporation Rd at the entrance of Grange Gardens waiting for the bus to arrive. "Waiting" is this week's word of importance. The Bridesmaids were waiting for the Bridegroom, but there were others who had also been invited, who showed no interest at the Bridegroom's imminent arrival. people of FAITH we must be seen as people of light , people of Hope , people of Love and forgiveness . We are all


Children of God and I pray we who live in Grangetown will lead by example to make this a community of Justice and
